

How The Swig Company Turned a 'Dead' Space into \$263K in Annual Income with Self-Storage

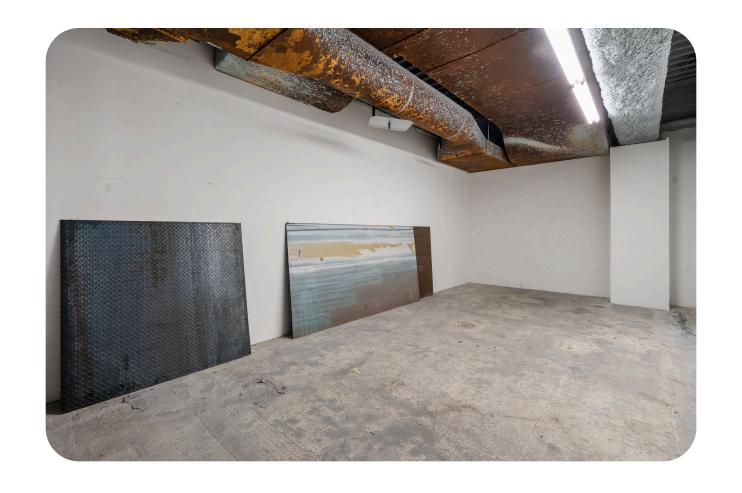

The Problem

At 6300 Wilshire Blvd in Mid-City Los Angeles, a mezzanine-level space sat vacant for years. With no windows, back-of-house access, and little appeal to traditional office tenants, it was excluded from the rent roll.

Despite generating no income, The Swig Company continued to cover taxes, utilities, and upkeep, making the space a liability.





The Solution

Stuf identified strong demand for storage in Mid-City Los Angeles, where residents and small businesses had limited options. Instead of forcing an office use, the mezzanine was reimagined as self storage facility.

The Swig Company partnered with Stuf under a five-year lease and revenue-sharing agreement. Stuf assumed responsibility for delivering a turnkey solution, while Swig had minimal burden or cost.

Implementation

Stuf executed quickly with limited disruption.

Design and Buildout

Modular storage units, upgraded lighting, access control, and branding

Operations

Full management of marketing, sales, and daily activity

Speed

From LOI to lease in under two months; launch completed within four weeks

Landlord Burden

Low capital outlay or additional staffing required
